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WHITE'S CHAPEL UMC VIM TEAM WORKS IN GUATEMALA

Before our team of 11 from White's Chapel United Methodist Church, Southlake, Texas, arrived in Quijuel, Guatemala, men and women carried heavy bags of sand, cinder blocks and other materials along narrow dirt paths amid rough terrain to their homes. Their hard work and the materials they carried were for a basic and essential item to everyday life – a simple stove with a flue for ventilation.

The pastor of the local Methodist Church identified the families who were in the greatest need. Our team worked with master stove builders and apprentices provided by Stove Builders of Guatemala. Working together we helped 18 families from the village of Quijuel build stoves in their homes. These stoves will vent the smoke from the living area providing a safer living environment.

Before the construction of these stoves, these Mayan families cooked over simple indoor wood fires – filling the rooms with thick smoke that left the walls and ceilings black with soot. As Mayan children stood and watched us work on the stoves, their nagging coughs reminded us of the importance of our work. With every cough we would say aloud to each other, “this is why we are here.” According to the World Health Organization, respiratory infections are the leading cause of death for children under 5 years of age in Guatemala. God was with us all along. We were humbled by the beauty, kindness, and amazing hospitality of the Mayan people. We got “down in the dirt” and used our hands to share the love of Christ with our Amigos por Siempre. I truly believe that we made some forever friends in Quijuel.

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FAQ (Frequently Asked Questions) *See next issue for more FAQs*

How many stoves have been built since SBG began? 1,692 have been built. Note that of that number 1,020 were built by the stove builders when no work teams were involved.

Do work teams build stoves in the summer? No because that is the “wet” season in Guatemala. Work teams go in the “dry season” Nov-April. Cement won’t set if it gets wet.

Where do work teams stay when in Guatemala? Usually in simple, comfortable hotels.

How much is the total cost of a trip? Costs are in the range of \$1,200-\$1,400 dependent on air-line fares, the number of stoves the group plans to build and location in Guatemala.

Reserving a place in a work team is \$100. You will know your total costs before you make your final payment. This cost includes: transportation to the country and within the country, meals, & hotel. Usually, the U.S.A. church raises money for the building materials and costs related to having the stove builders who are working with the team. Any personal purchases are not included. The shopping is great!

I have no idea how to build a stove. Will I be able to help the stove builder?

Yes. We have a booklet that explains the tasks work team members will do. The local stove builder will be the main builder and he knows how to involve you!

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
